### SECTION III: YOUR PROJECT DETAILS

#### *Project Details*

##### A. YOUR PROJECT SUMMARY

This project aims to introduce four income generating agriculture technologies in a package for improving the livelihoods of the *ex-kamaryia Tharu* families who are currently living in the resettlement camps with very limited land and resources to support their livelihoods. The characteristic feature of this project is the complementarity of one component with the other but ultimately contributing to income generation and livelihood support. This project aims to deliver the livelihood options even for those who have very limited asset or resource base. Four interventions like goat/pig/duck rearing, kitchen fish pond, apiculture and *Bagar Kheti* has been packaged together in a single program so that outputs of each could provide a sustainable and year round income for the participating families and could become a sustainable basis of livelihoods for these families. These interventions supported by organizational development, inputs and training support, group saving scheme and capacity building on technical and managerial aspects would lead to a sound and sustainable basis for income generation and livelihood improvement for the most impoverished community in Nepal.

SECTION IV: PROJECT QUESTIONS

Project Question 1

What is the problem(s)/issue(s) your project is addressing? What are the causes of the problem? (maximum 500 words)

This project is addressing the poverty and livelihood problem of the *ex-kamaiya Tharu* families, who are living under extreme poverty conditions in four districts of far-west Nepal. The root cause of the problem is the lack of vision, preparedness, and required homework of the government machinery before the freedom from their bonded labor hood. This decision was made as a political decision rather than a decision of social justice. Thus, these *Tharu* families are left without a suitable and viable opportunity/options and resources to sustain their livelihoods, which was dependent previously upon the provisions from their masters. Hence, with their freedom from bonded labor state, they are left without any livelihood options, thus facing disparate situation to manage their families. In this regard, despite being the bold step of social equality and justice, the freedom could not achieve its actual objective because of its inadequate preparation and inappropriate management, due to which, the freed *Kamaiyas* are having more acute problem than their bonded labor hood state. Each family was given only a small piece of poor land (5 *katha*) insufficient to feed the family and they are without any resources or skills for skilled jobs. While the adult male member of the family are mostly on the manual job, the female folks are without any occupation suitable to them, and the whole family is dependent upon the labor income of one member, which is insufficient to fulfill the basic needs of the family throughout the year. The most suitable occupation for this community would be agriculture, which they have been involved in their previous occupation. This project thus aims to introduce a package of income generating agriculture technologies to provide a sustainable livelihood strategy for *ex-kamaiya Tharu* families along with the initial support on enhancing their capabilities with training, inputs and market linkage. It is proposed that, initial investment on inputs will be recycled and used in future and the activities will be continued own their own. This project aims to demonstrate the poverty reduction strategy for the *ex-kamaiya* families by implementing these technologies on a pilot basis so that the successful technologies could be implemented in other settlements as well, which comprises of about 4300 *ex-kamaiya* families in Kanchanpur district itself.

Project Question 2

How does your idea address the problem(s)/issue(s) described above in terms of securing peace through development, delivery of basic services and expanding livelihood opportunities to rural population? (maximum 500 words)

The idea conceived in this project is the enhancement on capability of *Tharu* families on their traditional occupation by providing them with trainings, inputs and market access in a package of income generating agricultural practices, which will support the livelihoods of their families. The income generating agriculture package includes production of cucurbitaceae and beans on riverbanks (*Bagar Kheti*), along with apiculture, kitchen fishpond and duck/goat/pig farming. All these activities complement each other with their outputs and contribute jointly to family income and livelihoods. All these income generating agriculture activities has been common to the *Tharu* communities. The project aims to enhance this trait of *Tharu* community with initial support on technical, financial/inputs, managerial skills and market linkage, and utilize it for developing it as a viable and sustainable means of income generation, which could be managed on limited land resource base. In this context, this

project is aimed for the production and marketing of off-season vegetables (mostly cucurbitaceae and beans), livestock (goats, pigs/piglets and duck/ducklings/eggs), fishes and honey. All these commodities has very high market demand but has less sophistication, have minimal risk and need relatively less purchased inputs.

It is expected that each activity will contribute to farmers income as goat/pig keeping is expected to provide about 10-12000 rupees per annum from the sale of animals from second year onward, *bagar kheti* would contribute about 15000 rupees per kattha per year, bee keeping and fish farming would contribute about 4-5000 per annum each. All these income would add up to 35-40000 rupees per annum, which would be sufficient to manage the farmer's family modestly in the Terai region, where cost of consumer items is reasonably low.

The basic features of the project is the complementarity of one activity with the other and regular and sustained income from the outputs throughout the year, utilization of unused riverbanks for vegetable cultivation, high and regular demand of products and minimal land and other external inputs requirements.

All project activities would contribute for peace building and deliver basic services to the poor and disadvantaged groups living in the conflict affected areas and provide a viable means of income generation and livelihoods to the most deprived communities of Nepal in sustainable and self-perpetuating manner. Nepal has experienced conflict situation in the recent past and one of the contributory factor has been the lack of suitable livelihood opportunity for the common mass. Hence, providing suitable livelihood option will certainly contribute for securing peace through development in the country as it will deliver basic services to them and expand livelihood opportunity to the most deprived community.

### Project Question 3

How will you implement your idea? Describe in detail each of the activities/steps that your project will undertake to meet its objective(s). (maximum 600 words). Please provide a corresponding timeline in a separate sheet.

**1. Site selection and identification of the ex-kamaiya resettlement camp:** The ex-kamaiya resettlement camp located near the bank of a stream/river with sufficient *Bagar* area and with clay soil for pond digging will be selected. Preliminary information suggests that Banara or Bailkundi camps of Krishnapur VDC of Kanchanpur district would be suitable for these interventions.

**2. Identification of target families and preliminary interaction:** The participating families would be identified in the camp with the help of camp Mukhiya. Though the project aims to include all families of the camp in the program, yet due to financial limitations, the first group and second group will be identified on consent or through lottery system.

**3. Organization of farmers groups and baseline survey:** Farmers group will be organized in the selected settlement and preliminary interaction and baseline data on existing income level, source, livelihood strategy and socioeconomic condition will be collected. More preference will be given to include women members in the group and run the program on their leadership.

**4. Training of participating farmers:** A practical, informal, on the spot training will be organized for the participating farmers on group formation and organization, saving and credit concept, group saving and its management, market and marketing, and on technical aspects like improved practices of animal management, duck keeping, vegetable cultivation on the river banks (*Bagar Khet*), bee keeping, and fish rearing on kitchen ponds. In addition, one local resource person will be trained further on specific technology who will be able to provide immediate support to the community as and when required.

Group saving and credit policy will be finalized with consensus in the community. The group fund will be generated through contribution of participating families on sale of their products. In this fund, the project will contribute initially Rs. 25,000 to initiate the group fund activities.

**5. Purchase and distribution of animals and inputs:** At the beginning, fifty families will be provided with two animals (pigs/goats), two ducks, two beehives with bee colonies. Before the distribution of animals, the farmers will construct proper sheds for animals with some material support from the project. Each family, getting the animals and bee colonies will have to return back similar number of animals/colonies once the animal has produced the offspring/new colonies. These animals will be given to 50 new families as passing on gift, and this trend will continue in the following years. Thus more and more families will be included in the program in the succeeding years. Kitchen fishpond will be constructed by the farmers themselves and Magur (*Clarias*) fingerlings @ 50/sq m pond area will be provided. These fingerlings will be stocked during the month of Aswin and Baisakh and harvested in Falgun and Bhadra. The fingerlings will be fed on homestead waste, animal waste, apple snail and restaurant wastage collected from nearby areas.

*Bagars* (banks) of the streams will be acquired free or on lease from the VDC and allocated among the participating farmers. Following the training and fencing (live fencing), seeds and required inputs for vegetable farming on *Bagars* will be provided to the farmers.

**6. Participatory project management and market linkage:** The project site will be regularly visited and any problems encountered will be sorted out. An effective market linkage will be established involving local traders for supply of inputs and marketing of the outputs.

**7. Dissemination of project outputs:** The project outputs will be disseminated to other resettlement camps through visits, development agencies, media and by formal and informal interaction workshop organized in the district. The final technical report will be published and distributed to concerned agencies.

**Project Question 4**

How is your idea innovative or different from existing approaches that are addressing the problem(s)/issue(s) you have described in question one? Why did you choose this particular approach? To your knowledge, what on-going efforts exist in this area that addresses this problem? Has your idea been implemented elsewhere or in a different context? If so, where? What specific characteristics of your project idea demonstrate that you are applying a novel/pioneering approach? (maximum 700 word)

Our idea is innovative as it aims to introduce the most successful income generating agricultural technologies in a package for the most deprived communities with little or no resource base. Goat/pig/duck rearing, fish farming, apiculture and *Bagar Kheti* have been adopted by many organizations for income generation and livelihood improvement, but mostly individually as a single program. The current project is innovative as it aims to combine four income generating agriculture technologies in a package in which one activity complements the outputs of the other. This project aims to combine four technologies together to deliver viable livelihood options, which could sustain the livelihood of the family on a long-term basis and provide regular income throughout the year. This approach would be possible even for those families who do not have any asset or resource base of their own as the activities could be carried out on a leased land. The project is holistic and self-sustainable following the initial support as it introduces group saving and human resource development as local resource person to deliver the services locally as and when required. All these factors ascertain the financial and organizational continuity of the project. This approach is different from traditional system, because it is output oriented, holistic and enhances the capability of the community in a complete package, which would be sustainable and adopted by the marginalized families.

Goat keeping or pig farming has been adopted as the pathway out of poverty by many organizations/institutions as a single program. Similarly *Bagar kheti* has been promoted by many NGOs/INGOs (FORWARD, HELVETAS) as one of the options of income generation in the Terai region of the country. Apiculture has also been adopted by many institutions as one of the approach for income generation and livelihood improvement especially when marketing of organic honey has been in high demand. The kitchen fishpond has been evaluated by NARC in the field and was found very appropriate for smallholder poor farmers. These technologies contribute to income and livelihood to a certain degree, and because the resources are limited there is a limitation that these technologies could contribute to sustain the livelihood. Thus, despite being a source of certain income, it is difficult to maintain the livelihoods of the family on a single technology especially if the resources are limited.

Our idea is to combine these four technologies, which require little land, have limited risk and the outputs of one will contribute to the other. For example, the forages available from *Bagar kheti* will be feed for animals and their manure will be the fertilizer for vegetables. In addition, apiculture will contribute for pollination and the flowers will be the source of food to the honeybee. The fish reared on kitchen ponds could be managed on kitchen waste, animal manure and duck dropping. Thus the characteristic feature of this project is the complementarity of one activity to the other and all contributing to income generation and livelihood support to the families living under resource poor environment. Due to these features, it could be regarded as a novel and pioneering approach for livelihood support.

**Project Question 5**

SUPPORT Foundation is the leading professional NGO of far west region working on natural resource management and livelihood improvement of the communities. Our organization has implemented projects on various aspects of agriculture including maize improvement from HMRP and NARDF, sheep and goat management with NARDF funding in collaboration with NARC, yak study with Heifer International funding, Goat improvement with HELVETAS funding, apiculture with APPSP funding, rice and moong upscaling with CAZS funding and more recently rice and legume up scaling with RIUP funding. We have the technical and administrative manpower competent to implement the project activities in a competent and professional manner. Our staff are fluent in local language and some of our staff belong to Tharu community themselves, which makes the communication and dealing with this community easier. We have a well-established office management and financing system in place and experience of working with donor community.

We have also the experience of successful implementation of previous NDM 2005 project "Livelihood improvement with market oriented livestock production (project no 364) in the Chumala and Bardi settlements of ex-karnaiya tharu families, which has resulted significant improvement in the livelihoods of these families and each family is earning about 10-12000 rupees per annum from the sale of goats. Present project is the extended version of the previous project with short and long-term approaches for income generation on a continuous basis throughout the year.

**Project Question 6**

Mr. Prem Raj Ojha will be the project team leader for this project. Mr. Ojha has a professional background of more than 30 years as agricultural extension and training officer in government of Nepal. Mr Ojha is an agriculture graduate from Punjab Agricultural University Ludhiana, Punjab in 1982 and has also obtained various other on the job training related to agriculture, training and communication. Mr Ojha will be assisted by a project officer and a site motivator for smooth implementation of the project activities. The NARC team will assist in project implementation, management, training and monitoring of the project. This team has considerable experience of implementing livelihoods related projects in the field.

**Project Question 7**

The role of our primary partner organization is the technical backstopping and to provide resource persons available on the technologies that are being implemented in the community. The main activities of the partner organization involvement would be:

1. Training of the farmers on intervention technologies
2. Monitoring and evaluation of the project implementation and advice necessary corrections as required.
3. Technological support on various aspects of project activity implementation.

NARC has been implementing the project successfully in collaboration with SUPPORT Foundation on migratory sheep and goats in Darchula district on NARDF funding. The formal agreement of collaboration for this project is attached herewith the proposal.

**Project Question 8**

Who are the principal beneficiaries of the project activity? Please describe the degree of acceptance that the project has among beneficiaries and the level of participation, if any, of the beneficiaries in the project. (Maximum 300 words)

The project will directly reach to one hundred farming families with whom the project activities will be implemented. Hence, these families will be the principal beneficiaries of the project activities, but more families could be included later on a passing on gift of animals. During the first year, as the project budget could not accommodate all families for providing the animals/birds and bee hives, hence, only fifty farm families will be given the livestock/bee hives and colonies and these families will contribute the first new born animals/birds/bee colonies (animals of about 2 months age) to other farmers on a passing on gift basis to include remaining farm families in the program during the succeeding years. The farmers themselves with some material and technical support from the project will construct animal shed. The community will carry out *Bagar khett* in a cooperative manner and income obtained will be shared on the basis of labor input. Project will provide inputs and technical services at the beginning only. The farmers themselves will construct kitchen fishpond and project will supply fingerlings and trainings.

The indirect beneficiaries of the project will be the numerous farmers and farming communities and the ex-kamalya resettlement in other areas, where the technology could be disseminated and successfully adopted. Similarly, the development agencies, extension services and other institutions involved in income generation and livelihood improvement programs, could also be benefited by the technology developed during this project.

**Project Question 9**

What are the expected outcomes/results of your project? How are they measurable? How do these results/outcomes help your targeted beneficiaries? If possible, indicate how many beneficiaries your project expects to reach. How should Nepal Development Marketplace 2008 measure project success after implementation is complete? **The expected outcomes are:**

1. Livelihood improvement of ex-kamaiya Tharu families through package introduction of income generating agricultural technologies.
2. Demonstration of suitable approach for livelihood improvement of resource poor farmers.

**These outputs could be measured by:**

1. On the long term, the outputs could be measured by evaluating the improvement on livelihood indices of the participating families over the baseline level indices, which include, income, expense, consumption, health, education and their general well-being.
2. On the short-term basis, these outputs could be measured by sale of different agriculture commodities like vegetable, animals, eggs/birds, fish and honey/bee colony by the participating farm family and the income obtained from the sale of these commodities.
3. It is also expected that with the development of market-oriented agriculture, other related enterprise would also develop in the area, which could also be regarded as an indicator of the success of the project.

In the current phase, the project aims to reach directly to 100 farm families in which animals/birds and beehives will be given to one half of the families in the first year, and these families will contribute the new born animals/birds/bee colonies to other farmers on a passing on gift basis to include remaining farm families in the program during the succeeding years. The community will carry out *Bagar khelt* in a cooperative manner and income obtained will be shared on the basis of labor input. Kitchen fishpond will be constructed by the farmers themselves and project will supply fingerlings and trainings. Nepal Development Marketplace 2008, could measure the project success by measuring the adoption rate of the technology, its vertical and horizontal dissemination and its direct impact on the livelihoods of the participating ex-kamaiya families using various indicators of livelihoods.

**Project Question 10**

What characteristics of your project would you highlight to suggest that it is sustainable beyond the phase funded by Nepal Development Marketplace 2008? Please describe both organizational sustainability and financial sustainability, and indicate specific details (agreements from other donors, projected revenue flows) that can be verified to suggest that your project is sustainable and can leverage Nepal Development Marketplace 2008 funding. The following are the characteristics, which will determine its sustainability beyond the phase funded by Nepal Development Marketplace 2008:

1. Enhanced organizational and management capability of the participating community on production and production management during the project implementation period will be the main basis for sustaining the project activities beyond NDM 2008 grant period. Training of Local Resource Persons (LRPs) on specific agricultural practices would cater the day to day need of the community and will ensure service delivery at the site beyond the project phase. Development of the cooperative approach among the participating farmers and establishment of marketing linkage with the local traders and service providers will provide the services and support required for the program. In addition, the participating farming community will have established strong and effective relationship with implementing local organization for any assistance required for the program. All these will determine the organizational/institutional sustainability of the project.

2. The financial sustainability of the project will be assured by establishment of a saving and credit scheme initiated by the project with initial contribution of Rs. 25,000, from the project. It is expected that each participating family would be able to sell vegetable, animals, fish and honey, birds, eggs and contribute to group saving scheme as 10-20% of the income as decided by the participating farmers. This income would be sufficient to continue the activities in future in a self-sustaining basis. Sustainability of program has also been evident from our previous track record with the success of previous NDM 2005 (No 364) program implemented by our organization on goat raising in this community, to which organization has been providing regular follow up and support which resulted significant benefits to the community and is being continued by the farmers in an enhanced scale.

**Project Question 11**

What is the possibility of implementing your idea/project elsewhere (in different parts of the country)? (Maximum 200 words)

The possibilities of implementing the project idea in other parts of the country are extremely high, because, 31% of the national population is living below poverty line and there is a need to develop a suitable strategy for the poverty alleviation of this mass, which could be suitable and adoptable under the resource poor environment. Success of this approach and technology package would be rewarding not only to poverty reduction but also to women empowerment, cooperative development, environment conservation and thus overall community development. Furthermore, as these agenda are highest in the national priority, it is hoped that they will be implemented widely and rapidly in other parts of the country under similar domain.

**Personnel:** 270,000 (18% of total project cost, which includes expenses for one community motivator, man days for project team leader, project officer, field assistant, admin and finance staff and resource persons from partner organization).

**Materials and Equipment:** 350,000 (23% of the project cost is for contributing to make animal shed and manger, digging of fish pond, purchase of bee hives and fencing cost for vegetable plots, purchase of agrochemicals, plastic sheets and polythene pipes).

**Training:** 175,000 (11.7% of the project cost for providing training on animal rearing, kitchen pond fish production, apiculture and *Bagar kheti* vegetable production. In addition, one local resource person (LRP) will be trained on specific skills each on *Bagar kheti*, Apiculture, Kitchen fish pond and livestock rearing and also for initial contribution of NRs 25000 to group fund).

**Travel:** 175,000 (11.7% of the project cost on travel for training, input purchase, implementation, monitoring and evaluation and other necessary activities related to the project).

**Others:** 300,000 (20 % of the project cost is for the purchase of animals, bee colonies, fingerlings, vegetable seeds and other necessary items).

**Evaluation/Information dissemination:** 80,000 (5% of the project cost for monitoring and evaluation and dissemination of information/findings of the project through publications, visits and workshop)

**General Administration/Overhead:** 147,000 (9.8% of the project budget for general administration and overhead of the project).

**Other Funding Sources:** 500,000 from the internal sources of SUPPORT Foundation in kind e.g. Office space, computers and secretarial services, training space, training materials and resource persons.

SUPPORT Foundation is implementing livelihood support program funded by other donors like HELVETAS, DFID as well. The nature of the project is similar, so these donors could be pursued but no definite indication has been received so far.


